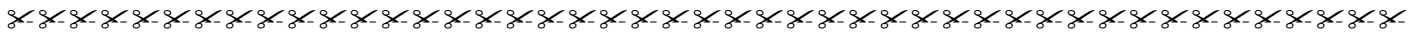

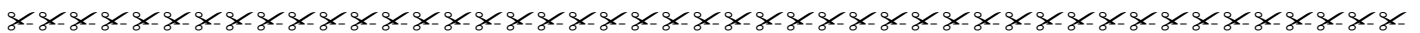

March 15 Meeting - Joe Wood: The Artist Outran the Banker!

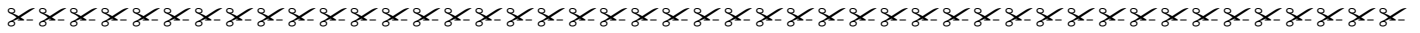
We are delighted to welcome Joe Wood, quilt designer and co-owner of Thimble Creek, to the SFQG podium on March 15. In 2000, Joe made a millennium change, leaving a 31-year career at Wells Fargo to follow his heart back into art. But this time, he sought to express himself not through commercial art, but through fabrics, specifically quilts. He has been a guest designer for Moda, and publishes his own pattern line.

Joe's quilts are intricate and traditional, yet always a visual feast for the eye. His love of detail is rivaled in my mind only by his enthusiasm. We'll come away inspired by his remarks and his trunk show.



April 19 Meeting - Lura Schwarz Smith: A new image of quilts.

Award-winning quilter and author Lura Schwarz Smith will expand our quilting possibilities as she describes her innovative new quilt design process at our April 19 meeting. A graduate of San Francisco State University with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Art, Lura has been producing textile art for over 30 years. On her website, she comments that 'Before that, she was making very bad traditional bed quilts with her first quilting partner, her mother, starting in the 1960s.' Lura's honors include being included in the "30 Distinguished Quilt Artists of the World" exhibit at the first Tokyo Dome quilt show in 2002. One of her quilts is included in the "100 Best American Quilts of the 20th Century," The list of her awards and honors garnered at regional, national, and international quilt shows is extensive. Be ready for an exceptional visual treat with Lura's presentation.

"Happy as a Clam" with Tish Chung

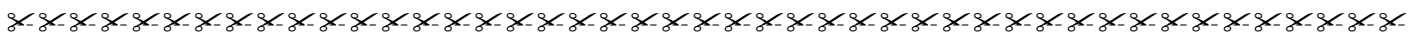
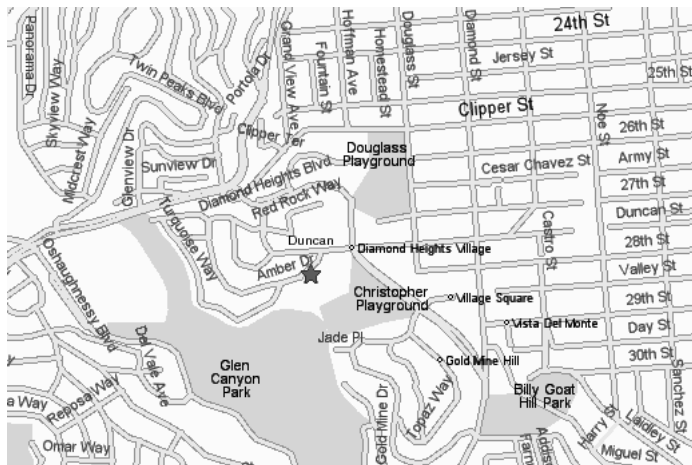

EMBROIDERERS' GUILD OF AMERICA

Tues. April 19 10AM-1PM: Blackwork at Lincoln Park Presbyterian Church, 31st and Clement Street, San Francisco. Celebrate the 550th birthday of Queen Isabella of Spain learning the double-running geometric stitches of Blackwork with SF EGA. You know Sashiko stitches, so now try these patterns once called Spanish work that were created to resemble lace when black silk was stitched on white linen background fabric. A royal court edict was issued that only certain persons of rank could wear lace, so the appeal of Blackwork enabled the wearer to appear more noble during its popularity. Check Hans Holbein's portrait paintings where the stitches can almost be counted and duplicated. The free program today uses evenweave fabric to make it easy to follow the warp and weft and single strands of cotton floss or pearl cotton with a pattern for a tissue (Kleenix™) case from Georgia teacher Marion Scoular. 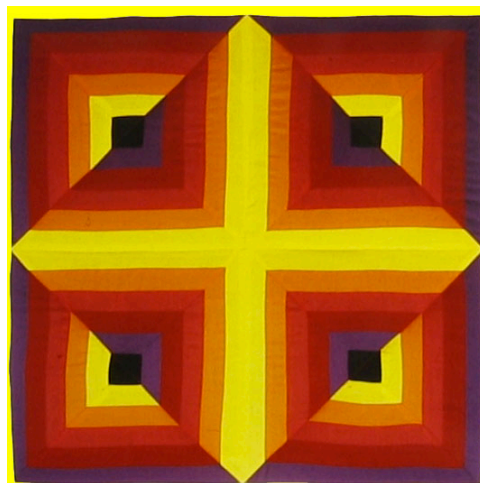
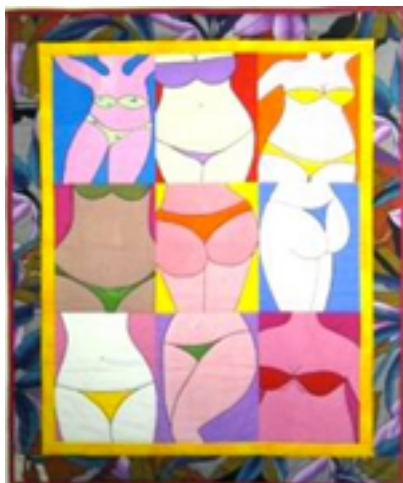


IN MEMORIAM - JEAN RAY LAURY

Fresno artist Jean Ray Laury, a key national figure in the renaissance of quilting during the 1970s and 1980s and an internationally known fiber artist and author, died Wednesday. She was 82.

Mrs. Laury's work was a staple of the local arts scene for decades. She had two solo exhibitions at the Fresno Art Museum and participated in numerous group shows throughout the area. More recently, she had a retrospective exhibit at the San Jose Museum of Quilts and Textiles in 2004. A graduate of Stanford University, Mrs. Laury developed an international reputation in the world of quilting and fiber arts, and traveled as a guest lecturer, including to Australia, Belgium, France, Norway and South Africa. In 1999, her work was included in a Houston installation titled "America's 100 Best Quilts of the 20th Century." She was one of "30 Distinguished Quilters" selected for inclusion in the 2002 International Great Quilt Festival in Tokyo. Mrs. Laury wrote more than 30 books, many about the fiber arts. But her interests were wide-ranging. She wrote and illustrated children's books. And in a 1977 work titled "The Creative Woman's Getting-It-All-Together at Home Handbook," she tackled a pertinent issue among female artists. One of her suggestions: turn the family dining-room table into an artistic work space. "She was an instigator in getting women to realize they could do their own creative work while still maintaining a household," her husband said. "Many women wrote saying how much that book made a difference in their lives in terms of doing creative work."
