ear Fellow Quilters~Happy New Year! Did you make any New Year's resolutions related to quilting, sewing, or crafting? Most of us have a box of UFOs, a stack of orphan blocks, an unorganized sewing room, or a long list of quilts on our bucket list. Always wanted to try a new technique? This month is the time to do something about these.

- Don't wait for spring cleaning to organize your sewing space. Many of our community quilts have come from unfinished blocks or unwanted fabrics donated to the free table. Go through your stash and bring in all those fabrics you won't ever get to. Or organize a swap with members of your sewing circle: everybody brings two fat quarters to the next meeting and walks away with two different ones.
- That unfinished quilt that you only made six blocks for (it didn't really want to be a queen size)—take the finished blocks and make it into a lap quilt and you'll be done in no time. Can't face looking at them anymore? Donate these orphan blocks to the free table and let someone else finish them. (My Round Robin quilt has a whole border made from orphan blocks someone put on the free table and I love it.)
- Want to try a new technique but don't want to commit to an entire quilt? Join the 2020 Round Robin and try something new for a single border. Plus you will have a wonderful quilt of your own by the end of the project.
- \bullet I went on Pinterest and typed in <Sewing Room Organization>. I got 26,800,000


results in less than one second. Surely there is something there to help me get organized!

Maria is a prolific quilter who developed her skills and explored her creativity while raising three boys in the wilds of Alaska. She now travels extensively sharing her knowledge and personal exploration in quilting. For us, Maria will be giving her lecture: Traditional, Art, Modern— Notes from the Field, her journey













from traditional quilt-maker into the art- and modern-quilt movements.

Maria's work has been juried into many exhibits around the country with her upcoming speaking and teaching engagements taking her not only to California but to locations including Texas, Maryland, Switzerland, and throughout Canada.


In recent years Maria has had solo shows in Alaska, Florida, and Hello Stitch in Berkeley. Her first book, *Improv Patchwork: Dynamic Quilts Made with Line & Shape* was published in 2017. This year her work is being shown in Michigan and Texas and in a number of SAQA regional and global travelling exhibits.

In addition to teaching at Craft Napa and Bay Quilts (Social

Rotary Cutter Accident—Two Damaged Fingers



"My hand-eye coordination is not what it was twenty-five years ago when I first started using a rotary cutter. November 15th I thought I was placing the blade of the rotary cutter against the side of the ruler, ready to cut along the edge, slicing the fabric at the desired point. Instead, the blade was resting on top of the ruler. When I pushed forward, the blade skid across the ruler and slammed into the index finger of my hand holding the ruler, cutting the finger to the bone. My reaction was quick but as I pulled my hand away, the blade continued forward, cutting across the surface of the finger nail and continuing on against the next finger where it cut all the way through the nail. Blood everywhere . . . I was home alone at the time. Luckily a friend answered my call for help and drove me to the emergency room. Eight stitches in the index finger, six in the next finger with three of these stitching across the two sides of the severed fingernail. There is a **safety protective glove** to prevent such accidents. Had I been wearing one, the glove would have stopped the blade and prevented the accident. I bought a pair on the internet for seven dollars. I don't know the brand name. These gloves are worn by professional butchers. You might see someone wearing them in your local butcher shop. **Be Safe**—and protect your hands.

You will need solid and semi-plain cottons—no patterns, please. You can choose any colors you like but be sure to *include black and white*; this should unify the final quilt that our lucky winner will put together. You could imitate a section of "Uptown Rail Fence" exactly, or you can create your own stripey block. Maria's style is very organic, cutting without a ruler and enjoying all the happy accidents that occur when working this way. Take a look at the photos I took while making my block. Your block should finish at 12½" or a little more. This is the block we will

Here's a little bit about her gleaned from her website: Sonya Lee Barrington, native of San Francisco, began sewing with her grandmother on a treadle machine when she was young. Grandma Mabel taught her both the basics of thrift with cloth and the love of working with needle and thread.

She has been fortunate to have been able to support herself and her family working in the field of the needle arts. First as a partner in a sandal shop in the Haight Ashbury (1966–1968); then as a partner in a craft co-op in the trendy shopping area of Sacramento Street (1968–1970), and lastly in a quilt shop in the Union Street area (1978–1980). She began using the medium of quilts as her means of expression in 1968 and was a faculty member in the Textile Arts Department of City College of San Francisco from 1975 to 1993.

A sought-after teacher and lecturer on her subject, her teaching has brought her to Australia and New Zealand as well as all parts of the United States.

A woman of many interests, from 1990 to 2000 Barrington produced a line of hand-dyed and textured fabrics that she used in her work and sold both wholesale and retail to quilters and shops.

The 21st century brought her to many craft shows exhibiting and selling works made using her own line of fabric. She also began her exploration and fascination with wool and the notion of material Reimagined, Recycled, Reused, Repurposed and Zero Waste. This took its form in the availability of unique fabric that is found in previously

worn garments. Men's cotton dress shirts became flouncy half-aprons, toddler's dresses, and rompers; denim jeans morphed into several styles and sizes of bags. Wool garments turned into many different varieties of bags, Christmas stockings, and one-of-a-kind quilts.

Currently Barrington sells her **Recycled**, **Reused**, **Repurposed and Zero Waste** products at small local craft shows, the Marin County Sunday Farmer's Market, and Grand Lake Oakland Saturday Farmer's Market. Go to her website for dates, and more information:

With Fabric & Thread is a beautifully illustrated book with more than twenty inspired quilting and sewing patterns. What makes this book stand out is that it includes a bridge between these two crafts—of sewing and piecing—with clear, concise instructions that anyone could follow. Plus, the author, Joanna Figueroa, has been designing fabric collections for many years that all manage to warmly complement and play off each colour, so her sharing of her own story and the reasoning behind her consistent colour palette is fascinating, along with her encouragement for you to "make it yours" so that even though the projects are ubiquitous—pincushions, child's dress, quilts, aprons, slippers, tote bag, shoulder bag, lunch bag, pillow cover, table runner . . . and more—the projects in this book are still practical and charming. Joanna's approach differs from other quilters because she includes patterns that can be accomplished two different ways, one using sewing techniques and one using quilting techniques. The result is two unique looks from a single pattern.
