The San Francisco Quilters Guild offers several opportunities for learning and camaraderie. *Sewcials* are free get-togethers where members learn a skill or technique from a fellow guild member, pick up tips and tricks, build friendships, and have fun.

Workshops present the specialties of quilt professionals from California, around the country, and beyond, and charge a fee. In addition, occasional community-outreach sewcials allow members to work together on charitable projects.

Workshops are open to all guild members on a 'first-come' basis. One must register with payment to confirm participation. Workshops are publicized to guild members first, and members have the benefit of several months of promotion to register before any non-guild members may register. Two months prior to the Workshop, the Workshop will be offered to the public, at a non-guild-member rate. For the guild to host professional instructors we need to cover instructor costs and therefore once an individual is registered there are no cancellations/refunds. Members may "transfer" their registration to another member; the guild and its workshop chairs will not be responsible for this exchange and all arrangements and funds will be exchanged between the individual guild members. Once a member has found someone to exchange with, they are responsible for notifying the guild chairs so that the appropriate attendee will be notified of all class information.

Line Dancing & Geometricks: Two Virtual workshops with Brenda Gael Smith



Gentle Readers, Please note that the deadline for submission of articles to *Quilters Cables* now falls **three** weeks prior to its publication. This means that if you want to promote an event that falls between the submission deadline and publication date, it must be written in the past tense, e.g. "We held . . .". The event will be over by the time of publication. Assume

that the newsletter publication date is the date of the general meeting, the third Tuesday of every month.

Suggestions: If the event that you are promoting falls within the submission deadline/publication window, please consider the following:

- Submit the promotion one month earlier so that it is still a future event.
- Submit the promotion one month later as an event that has already occurred.

Cool Decisions

We decided to escape not only the fog and chill of a San Francisco Summer, but also the 4th of July bombardment of noise and illegal (but astounding!) displays of neighborhood fireworks. Sunny oven-baked Fresno appealed to us because our friends had a lovely garden, a beautiful pool, and air conditioning. Perfect!

The guest pool house had a charming blue-and-white hand-made quilt on the bed, which I found unusual considering the very warm weather. But on closer inspection I saw it had no batting. This is known as a Summer quilt, something I had researched when making a baby quilt for a friend in Hawai'i.



Summer quilts can be just the right amount of coziness when the air conditioner is on or the temp drops at night. However, a thin batting of flannel can be added to soften the drape and show more quilting detail. A pricier choice would be a silk-blend batting.

Another lightweight option is a Kantha quilt, which is made from layers of Indian saris or old clothing, then quilted with a series of uneven long running stitches. I am now in the process of deciding how to use Kantha squares I bought on Etsy for another baby quilt. Sujata Shah, of course, is well-known for teaching similarly made Kawandi quilts stitched by the Siddhis from the African diaspora.



There are so many decisions when making a quilt. Tradition dictates many of my choices because the techniques and patterns are so well-known and information is readily available. A quilt with no batting may seem like a guilty faux pas, but it will be just the right coverlet for early Summer mornings in Fresno or wherever a bed needs a beautiful reminder that it's okay to get cozy before the temp gets to 100°!

July S'mores Celebrations ©2021

Are there festivities happening again this Summer? Or will your sewing skills prompt as simple an occasion as sending marshmallows, chocolate, and graham crackers? The s'mores supposed history, dates back at least to 1927 when a recipe for the more formally designated "some mores" was published in *Tramping and Trailing with the Girl Scouts*, while graham crackers were invented in 1829 (by Sylvester Graham, a Presbyterian minister). Whether or not you celebrate the National Confectioners' Association's designated August 10th National S'mores Day (according to chiff.com/home_life/holiday/national-s-mores-day.htm, although not actually recognized by Congress), these treats are easy to make and delicious!

Pre-pandemic, at our guild free table, I picked up ingredients of fabric reminding me of the campfire treat, but maybe I willingly see chocolate without much excuse. Marshmallows are a soft, spongy, sweet food made from corn syrup, sugar, and gelatin and they can be made at home: which takes them to another level: foodnetwork.com/search/marshmallows-



While you contemplate the history of s'mores, put your sewing skills to use! Measuring a shallow basket, this decorative custom cover was constructed. Before sewing pillowcase-style three sides of personalized fabric to festive Mardi Gras-print patchwork backing to make the cover reversible, twenty inches of 1/8-inch-wide grosgrain ribbons were inserted so I could tie the lined cover through the basket, weaving corners. A slightly smaller rectangle of plastic canvas was slid into the



opening to stiffen the cover before slip-stitching the case to close. This makes the gift further reusable as a shallow carrying container for other dessert preparations (or use washable oilcloth or vinyl lining for casseroles or frosted concoctions). Another idea: simple drawstring-bag version in patriotic lighthouse colours accommodates even the box of graham crackers. An alternative gift: a s'mores cookie cutter of molded 3-D PLA* plastic in sizes from two to six inches (from Ohio) at sweetprintsinc.com. *PLA (polyactide) is made from starch-rich plants such as corn, wheat, sugar beets.


