As to our future, we will be producing a guild-wide survey to determine how best to meet members' (both old and





Monday February 12 @ 7 P.M. by zoom. Quilter/artist Kestrel Michaud will present her lecture Design for Realism that focuses on incorporating principles of good design into art-quilt layouts with the intent of creating a

Since then she was classically trained in art school, had a career as a graphic designer, and returned to fabric arts in 2018. In 2021 she won a grand prize at Houston. All of Kestrel's quilts are in the style of imaginative realism. She has an entire imaginary steampunk world in her head, complete with

characters, locations, and events. This lecture, *Design for Realism*, is focused on incorporating principles of good design into art-quilt layouts with the intent of creating a realistic piece of art using fabric as a medium. Appliqué + Piecing = New Possibilities, with Sheila Frampton Cooper (virtual / zoom workshop)

Two three-hour sessions for six total hours (note the different times) Saturday, 4th February: 10 A.M., and Saturday, 10th February: 1 P.M.

Award-winning (Houston, Paducah, etc.) and world-renowned quilt artist . . . highly sought-after instructor . . . cover girl





for *Simply Moderne* magazine, and more . . . and her work has been displayed in the United States, France, England, Italy, China, and Japan—Sheila is known for her bold, graphic, and colorful work. For our guild, Sheila will be teaching a two-session workshop. This gives you the great opportunity to work on your piece between sessions and receive valuable feedback.

Afraid of the 'A' word? Don't think 'A' is your cuppa . . . Well, this is not like any 'A' you have done before! In *Appliqué* + *Piecing* = *New Possibilities* you will learn to create your own original pattern and assemble the forms using a technique called Appli-piecing, originally developed by

Caryl Bryer Fallert-Gentry. With this technique, you can bring almost any complex abstract or realistic idea into quilt form. You will retain a clean, graphic look and when complete, you will have a quilt top pieced together with a ½"seam allowance.

The site of the Santa Rosa retreat is magnificent. This recently rebuilt retreat center in the Santa Rosa hills offers beautiful indoor and outdoor spaces, fine accommodations, fabulous food, and large program spaces. The site includes a dedicated sewing space with floor to ceiling windows, making every workstation fill with bright ambient daylight. Camp Newman also is accessible for all mobility needs. Accommodations include the "Village": cabins with bunk beds and a shared bathroom; and the "Lodge", with hotel-style rooms with two queen beds, private bath, mini fridge, and a coffee maker. Camp Newman's chef is Cordon Bleu trained, and the meals prove it.

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Lincoln Park Quilters

Lincoln Park Quilters* is now an extension of San Francisco Quilters Guild. We invite guild members to visit and/or become regulars. We meet "in person" on the 1st, 3rd, and if there is a 5th Friday of each month (9:30–11:30 A.M.) at the Lincoln Park

Presbyterian Church. It is located at 417 - 31st Avenue off Clement Street, in San Francisco. Each attendee pays \$3 per visit to cover the space rental. We zoom from home on the even Fridays of the month at 10 A.M.



Our space includes a number of round and rectangular tables and chairs. We set up and put them away before we leave. There are also two wall storage cabinets for several of our sewing machines and quilting equipment. There is a kitchen and two bathrooms. The stage and tables may be used for pinning quilts. We also have stage space for free quilting items.

Through the years, we've sewed thousands of pillowcases, face masks, wheelchair quilts, quilts, holiday stockings, holiday bags, and preemie quilts going to clients of various organizations. Trudy Hom-Gee leads our volunteers to coordinate with Adrienne Hickman and Jessica Church in our guild's community-outreach projects.

Either Betty Tang-Fitzpatrick or Caroline Lieberman "calls the group to order," make announcements, ask for show 'n' tell, and schedule programs. Other members may demonstrate various quilt and craft techniques.

Weekly email reminders are sent with the zoom link or for our in-person gatherings with agreed-upon guidelines. The email may include information on upcoming quilting techniques and/or craft demonstrations.

*Caroline Lieberman, a founder of the San Francisco Ouilters Guild, was teaching this group through CCSF Community College until five years ago when CCSF stopped funding senior classes. Members wanted to continue, so Caroline appointed a core group to help coordinate the group and include Betty Tang-Fitzpatrick, Nancy Bardoff, Maren Larsen, Dottie McHugh, Julie Duerksen, and Jeanie Low. an extra day ahead to accomplish sewing. The 29th next month makes February a leap year. (photo 2) Our family has a great-nephew with his first celebration of his 2020 birth on his birth "day" this year. The internet says about five million people around the world have leap-year birthdays. My godmother Dinah Shore was born February 29, 1916. Julius Caesar was behind the origins of a leap year to allow Roman yearly calendar to keep pace with rotation of earth. "Leap" images usually include frogs, jumping humans, figures dropping off surfaces (cliffs, parachuting from planes). Use leap year to propel a gift for someone who needs encouragement to plunge into a 2024 adventure, be it a vacation or new vocation. Tips & Tricks

Recall on the Steamfast travelling iron; and Quilting Tips




Recalled Steamfast Iron Model SF-717 with bushing

- 1. There is a recall on the "Steamfast Home & Away Travel Steam Iron", a travelling iron (SF-717, SF-720, SF-727) purchased between January 2009 and September 2023, and Brookstone Steam Bug Travel Steam Irons. Be advised that Vornado Steamfast advises that the power cord may overheat the cord, posing fire and burn hazards. In addition, cord damage near the bushing can result in exposed copper wires, posing a shock hazard. Stop using the iron ASAP. File for a refund or replacement at: www.steamfast.com/recalls/travelirons. You will need to take a photo showing the iron with the cord cut, the model number, and your photo.
- 2. Mark the side with a green marker where two-prong electrical plugs fit into the electrical socket. Your plugs will fit in the correct position.
- 3. Put a white paper behind your sewing-machine needle when manually threading. The white paper acts like a light.
- 4. I have a supply of 1/4"-wide Velcro strips that I sew in place of a snap

and/or zipper when sewing little girl dresses, boy shirt buttons, or costumes.

- 5. The other day, my nineteen-year-old sewing machine wouldn't turn on. The electrical cord was in good condition and the bobbin winder wasn't engaged. Then I checked the light bulb, and it was burnt out. My machine "came back to life" after I replaced the light bulb.
- 6. I often burn or have fusible stabilizer stuck on my ironing board cover. Now, I wrap a heavier fabric over the ironing board top and use safety pins to tack the excess fabric to the back.

Help Wanted: California Heritage Quilt Project

The California Heritage Quilt Project is alive and moving forward! They are building on the success of earlier projects and developing new ones. The San Francisco Quilters Guild can and should participate in the revived project. All we need is someone to form a committee. Is that someone you? If so, please contact President Donna Logan or me, Adrienne Hickman.

San Francisco Quilters Guild was an important part of the beginning of CHQP starting in 1983 when a group of quilters, including our guild founder Caroline Lieberman, explored the feasibility of a search for early California quilts. Kentucky had done it, but California is a much bigger state. In 1984 the CHQP was

established, Quilt Search Days were held all over the state, and they registered over three thousand quilts. Those records are currently archived at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art. Eventually a selection of quilts was included in Ho for California! Pioneer Women and Their Quilts by Jean Ray Laury and the California Heritage Quilt Project published in 1990.

In the new century CHQP has gone digital and is promoting the Quilt Index Self-Submit process to all California residents who want to include their quilts in the California Heritage Quilt Project.

The first Heritage project included quilts from the beginning of California to 1945. The Index is documenting California's quilts of any age and style. If you decide to self-submit you should mention CHQP on the electronic form for self-submit at www.quiltindex.org to identify it as a California Heritage quilt.

The Quilt Index is an international repository, where the public has access for personal or scholarly research. It contains thousands of images, stories, and information about quilts and their makers, drawn from hundreds of public and private collections around the world. The project, Matrix: The Center for Digital Humanities and Social Services, is housed at Michigan State University. It is a fantastic research tool.



Block of the Month: Kitty Block

Kitty Block, January 2024. Due February 20th, 2024

These cute cats sold me with their contrasting ears. For the body I used a Kaffe Fassett print. Use that if you have it or any other large-scale print. Use a contrasting solid for the ears. Use Kona Snow or any other white for the background.



Materials:

For white background cut: One 1.5" x 3.5" rectangle One 3" x 9.25" rectangle One 1.25" x 6.5" rectangle Two 3.5" squares

One 3.5" x 7.5" rectangle One 3.5" x 5.5" rectangle

For cat ears cut:

Directions:

1.—To make the ears draw diagonal lines on the wrong side of ear fabric squares. Lay the squares, right side down, on the corners of the white 1.5" x 3.5" strip. Diagonal lines should be angled in from the top edge of each corner to make a V shape. Sew along the diagonal lines. Trim seam allowance to 1/4" and press open. 2.—Sew ear block to the top edge of large body-fabric rectangle. 3.—Draw a diagonal line on one of the 3.5" white squares. Align square on top of the right side of small body-fabric rectangle. Diagonal line should run from top left to bottom right. Sew along the diagonal line. Trim seam allowance to 1/4" and press open. Sew second white square

to the white edge of the unit completed in Step 3. 4.—Sew two body units together to form the cat and press seams open. 5.—Sew 1.5" x 6.5" white strip along bottom edge of cat. 6.—Sew 3" x 9.25" white strip along left-hand side of block. Finished block will be 9" w x 9.25" h.




