Tuesday 16th April (a) 7 P.M. Jane Sassaman: Quilting against the Odds. This will be an in-person only meeting at St.




Anne's. This visual lecture is about accomplishing your work in spite of obstacles—family life, space limitations, etc. It is a pep talk and slide show that covers my inspirations and my obstacles. I encourage people to do "what you have to do" by using myself and other artists as examples. *About Jane*: After a varied career in the design world, Jane began to quilt in 1980. She found that these "soft paintings" satisfied the draftsman, the craftsman, and the artist in her. Consequently, she is now a dedicated

(some say "obsessed") quilt artist and fabric designer.

Her art quilts have been shown in many national and international exhibits, including Quilt



National 1989 through 2005 and Contemporary American Quilts, the first major exhibit of American art quilts in England. Her quilt *Willow* was named as one of the one hundred best American quilts of the century. Jane is also the author of *The Quilted Garden*. The book includes twenty years of her work and exercises for making nature-inspired quilts.



Jane's love for historic decorative arts can be seen in all facets of her work, but it is

especially evident in the exuberant fabric she is currently designing for FreeSpirit. Her designs are oversized and colorful and have been coined as "William Morris on anti-depressants". They are created for quilts, wearables, and home decorating. Her latest book, *Patchwork Sassaman Style*, beautifully illustrates her fabric "in action". Visit Jane's website here: janesassaman.com. Jane will soon be teaching an Empty Spools workshop at Asilomar 19th–24th April.

Tuesday 21st May @ 7 P.M. Sandra Bruce: Material Matrix. Sandra Bruce brings us her "Material Matrix" lecture. Her technique was inspired by painter Chuck Close. It involves using a gridded photograph and interpreting each two-inch

square into fabric, using piecing to achieve the effect. She will present an overview of the evolution of Material Matrix and how it works, along with her colorful visual journey that brought her to this technique.

Sandra Bruce was born in Richmond, Virginia to deaf parents. Raised to believe she could do



anything she put her mind to, she was never discouraged from being an artist. Sandra started sewing at age eight on her mother's treadle sewing machine and she has not stopped since. She took her first official quilting class in 1990 and she has been forever hooked.

Sandra has been an illustrator and letterer for 35 years and started her quilting business in 2010. She feels that quilting on her longarm, named Dixie, is doing what she's done all those years but with a different tool. She comes to us from Grass Valley where she lives with her partner of forty years, Gary. You can read more about Sandra: <u>sandrabruce.com</u>.

Part of my love of co-chairing Community Outreach is bringing all your beautiful quilts to people who need a quilty hug, and the hope that the quilt they choose brings them comfort and joy. Our recent deliveries to the Salvation Army Rehabilitation Program have made me even more glad to be a part of Community Outreach.

These deliveries have let me see the positive impact that our quilts have on the people we bring them to. The first time Adrienne and I brought the quilts to their Monday night meeting, neither the program director nor we knew how they would be received. These are some rough-and-tumble guys that have had some really challenging life experiences. But upon arrival we could tell they were excited. Once the quilts were being handed out, we had so many thanks and were told stories of the quilts in their lives. This most recent delivery was no exception. We could sense the excitement from the new residents when we arrived. We were greeted with smiles and waves, and could hear them chatting and saying, "Do we get our quilts tonight?" Sitting in on their Monday night meeting, I realized





These quilts bring them something that is theirs and are an encouragement from the community at large to let them know that people care. They proudly display them at the foot of their beds and new participants eagerly await their chance to pick their own quilt. As I am writing this, I received a text from Sheila, the program director, with the pictures she took and a text letting me know that "Some of the guys are sending pictures home to their moms of their new quilts!" This delivery has really touched me, and I just wanted to share with you the joy and happiness I see

you providing with all your quilted love. Thanks as always for all you do, we couldn't do it without you.


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Choose Joy, or Fear?

This 750-piece "Stitch in Time" hexagon quilt design balanced on two cutting mats clamped together, motivated learning single foundation piecing MJ Kinman prepares for her gemstone-based creative designs. No confusing flip-and-sew construction so no wasted fabric. Ironing marked freezer-paper templates to right side of fabric for facets of Kinman designs allows for precision cutting a quarter-inch seam allowance. Appealing use of hatch marks to align seams and her numbering sequence is the perfect strategic Piece Plan that enabled complete block production in a single day of sewing. The sections are pieced separately to form units that become sewn together to yield gem crystalline facets. I recently received an email message from this designer, its story I feel is worth sharing, as the healing powers of choosing joy rather than dwelling on fear resonates at present:



MJ's February didn't turn out anything like she had expected, but became the best thing that has happened to her in decades.

In late January MJ and a friend headed to Cancun for some sunshine-and-laughter therapy; just what the doctor ordered! They lounged by the ocean, read for hours, ate great food, and just enjoyed each other's company. On the day she was to leave Cancun, MJ woke up with a sore throat. She masked up, dosed up, and flew home. Things got progressively worse, and she went to the ER. Once they saw her oxygen levels were super low, she was admitted right away.

Tested for everything-COVID, RSV, MRSA-but the bug turned out to be a common pneumonia virus, HMPV (Human

Metapneumovirus. She spent four days in the ICU until her lungs finally started fighting the infection. After eight days in the hospital, she could breathe well enough to come home.

Her hospital adventure was an amazing experience. Truly transformational. She saw for herself the real reason why choosing joy is so important. Choosing joy heals; choosing fear kills. Because MJ noticed when she would start thinking fear-based thoughts ("*I'm so scared. What if they have to intubate me? I don't want to die.*"), the monitor showed her oxygen-saturation levels sank. When she stopped those negative thoughts her oxygen level stabilized and started to rise. She was stunned. She knew that saying "no" to fear and choosing joy instead was important. And now she had



scientific data! She literally experienced that the effects of fear-based thoughts robbed her of life-giving oxygen, and calm, positive thoughts renewed her.

Choose to say "no" to fear and "yes" to joy every day. Nothing short of your precious physical and mental health depend on it.

Now on to some fun stuff! 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Block of the Month: Modern Spools

Modern Spools, April 2024. Due 21st May 2024.

For this contemporary spin on a traditional Spools of Thread block use a light grey background instead of white.

Materials:

For the thread: Use a blender or tone-on-tone print. Stay away from fussy prints or prints with lots of colors. one 5.25" x 6" rectangle for the "thread" color.

For the spool: Use any solid beige fabric.

two 1.75" x 6.5" rectangles. For the background:

Use any solid light grey fabric. four 1.75" x 2" rectangles for the ends of the spool, two 2.5" x 6" rectangles for the sides,

two 1.5" x 9.25" rectangles for the top and bottom.

Directions:

1-sew the small grey squares to the ends of the beige spool pieces.
2-sew the 2.5" x 6" rectangles to the sides of the thread-colored rectangle.
3-sew the spool pieces to the top and bottom of the thread pieces.
4-before you sew on the top and bottom take a minute to square up your block.
5-sew the long grey rectangles to the top and bottom of the spools.





Eight Tips for Success

(1.) To keep appliqué stems from shifting out of position while hand-stitching, pin over, rather than through, them.





- (2.) To wash small pieces of fabric without fraying the edges, put them in a salad spinner, rather than a washing machine. Spin with hot water and soap. Rinse in cool water, drain, and spin. Press the pieces dry.
- (3.) To match ends perfectly, lay two binding strips right sides up and overlap the ends by two inches. Cut though both layers at a 45° angle. Place strips right sides together and stitch a ¹/₄-inch seam.
- (4.) To make a sewing-machine needle easier to thread, shine a beam of light behind the needle's eye.
- (5.) To make a long row of even blanket stitches, machine-baste a visible line ¹/₄-inch from the edge of the fabric and use this basting line as a guide for stitch length.
- (6.) To make it easier to remove papers from foundation-pieced projects, run the handle end of a pair of scissors along each stitching line to weaken the paper.
- (7.) To more easily make triangle-squares from marked squares, press the sewn triangles open before cutting them apart. This method stabilizes the bias edges and prevents stretching.
- (8.) To machine-appliqué circular or oval pieces, first make marks that imitate the hours of a clock face on each appliqué shape. Pivot the fabric at each hour mark when you stitch. ~excerpted from *American Patchwork & Quilting*.

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Our book review for April 2024 is The Last Painting of Sara de Vos, by Dominic Smith, reviewed by Donna Rand.

This is an interesting work of fiction that covers three eras of time—the 1600s in Holland, the late 1950s in New York City,



and the year 2000 in Sydney, Australia. The plot is centered on a painting from the Golden Age of Dutch Painting. It is a landscape that was painted by a woman, Sara de Vos. There were only a few known women painters at that time and a landscape painting by a woman was extremely rare. The painting has been passed down through a Dutch family and is owned, in 1958, by a wealthy New York socialite.

A young Columbia University graduate art student, Ellie Shipley, works as a cleaner and restorer of old paintings. Ellie is hired to make a copy (forgery?) of the Dutch painting.

Years later, Ellie is now a renowned teacher and art curator in her hometown of Sydney, Australia. Will the discovery of the forgery ruin her reputation and her life? There is also some romance in the story but I won't tell you that. You have to read the book.

Both the painter, Sara de Vos, and the painting, At the Edge of a Wood, are fictitious, unfortunately.

The San Francisco Public Library has a copy of this book in several of their branches. It is worth seeking out.
